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Arts, Health, Culture, Sports and Youth Grant Schemes

ARTS IMPACT FUND

Art organisations that can demonstrate they are sustainable, have great artistic ambition and have a positive impact on society, can apply for repayable finance grants of £150,000 to £600,000 from the Arts Council England Arts Impact Fund.

The funding can be used for a range of activities - to refurbish a building, purchase equipment, pay salaries or buy in additional services to help the organisation generate more income.



To apply organisations must be:

- one with primary activity in the arts
- a regulated body with a charitable purpose
- registered as operating in England
- working in at least one area of social need that the fund supports.

Applications are accepted on a rolling basis.

GRANTS FOR THE ARTS

Grants of between £1000 and £100,000 are available for eligible individuals, organisations, libraries and museums.

They can cover a range of activities including: audiovisual, broadcast and transmission, buildings and infrastructure, capacity building, commissioning, digital creation, diversity and equality, education and learning, exhibition, festival, organisational development, original work, participation, performance, production, professional development, publishing, research and development, sector development, talent development and touring.

This is a rolling programme with no deadlines.

PRS MUSIC FOUNDATION

Not for profit organisations based in the UK with projects that involve the creation, performance and promotion of new music of any genre have until the 8th May to apply for up to £10,000 of funding from the current round of the Open Fund for Organisations.

The fund is available to any not-for-profit organisation based in the UK with an eligible project, including:

- Promoters
- Festivals
- Orchestras and large ensembles
- Talent development or composer development organisations
- Venues
- Curators

The programme's priority is to support an exciting range of projects, which have clear musical outcomes and tangible benefits for music creators of all genres and backgrounds and at different stages of their career. The funding can be used to support touring, recording, promotion and marketing, commissions of new music by UK based creators, music creators' residencies and live programmes featuring new UK music. The activity requesting funding must start at least 12 weeks after the deadline.

ARTS LIBRARIES FUND

The Arts Council libraries fund aims is to inspire innovative partnerships between libraries and arts organisations, and encourage library users and those living locally to take part in artistic and cultural activities.

It is hoped that the second phase of funding will once again inspire ambitious, innovative partnerships between libraries and arts organisations, and encourage library users and those living locally to take part in artistic and cultural activities.

Public libraries and people managing public libraries can apply for grants of between £1,000 and 100,000 to inspire innovative partnerships between libraries and art organisations to help engage people in England in art activities and help artists and arts organisations in carrying out their work. The grant will fund up to 90% of the cost of an activity.

In addition to activities involving theatre, music, dance, literature, visual arts, and combined arts, Arts Council England can also consider funding a broad variety of activities such as festivals, exhibitions, workshop programmes, residencies, digital projects, performances.

Public libraries can apply for grants of between £1,000 and £100,000 covering activities lasting up to three years. The fund closes on 31 March 2018.

Business

BIG SOCIETY CAPITAL

A new financial institution set up by the UK government to finance charities and community groups has been launched. Big Society Capital has £600million, of which the majority comes from unused cash in bank accounts that had been dormant for more than 15 years. The fund will back social enterprises that prove they can repay an investment through the income they generate. It will seek to connect social organisations to financial markets and to revolutionise the funding alternatives available to them. Most importantly it will provide new investment capital specifically focused on improving lives and supporting communities around the country.

The fund has already agreed investments worth £3.6m in a number of schemes including:

- Think Forward Social Impact, which helps young people into work and education; Franchising Works, which trains the unemployed how to run a franchise business.
- The Community Generation Fund, which supports the development of renewable energy infrastructure, such as solar panels and biomass boilers, for local communities.

TRAINING AND APPRENTICESHIPS

Employers wanting to upskill existing staff or build their workforce by looking into apprenticeships have a new year boost to their plans with the arrival of the Apprenticeship Hub Service. The Hub helps businesses with less than 250 employees throughout North Yorkshire, York and East Riding understand the types of training available, much of which is fully funded, and offers advice and sign-posting on apprenticeships.

The free impartial advice to employers is a key aspect of the service and it aims to help them understand the wide range of apprenticeships available, which type of training would suit the needs of their business and where they can get that training.

Part funded by the European Social Fund (ESF) the new service can also explain to employers the changes coming about later in the year with the apprenticeship reforms and levy.

Funding is available for employers who want to ensure those aged over 19 in their existing workforce have the skills to help improve their business. Over 1000 businesses are set to be helped with 1300 adult workers accessing training that leads to an apprenticeship.

The £2m ESF contract, awarded by the Skills Funding Agency through the York, North Yorkshire and East Riding Local Enterprise Partnership (LEP), is led and managed by the Grimsby Institute Group and involves more than ten delivery partners throughout the region.

GROWTH PROGRAMME

The RDPE Growth Programme provides funding for projects in England which create jobs and growth in rural economy.

Under the RDPE Growth Programme, there are grants for:

- Food Processing
- Business Development
- Rural Tourism Infrastructure

The grants are funded by the European Agricultural Fund for Rural Development (EAFRD) which is part of the European Structural and Investment Funds (ESIF).

BUSINESS GRANTS PROGRAMME

Support is available for inspiring businesses looking to grow within York, North Yorkshire and East Riding. The Business Grant Programme operated by the Local Enterprise Partnership (LEP), means that groups may be eligible for a grant of between £5,000 and £1 million to cover between 10-20% of the costs of a project within York, North Yorkshire and East Riding. Grants are available towards capital investment in land, building, plant, machinery and equipment or research and development.

HOME BUILDING FUND

The government has created a £3 billion fund to increase the number of homes built in England. You can apply if you're a private sector business that builds new homes or prepares sites for housing developments. This includes small builders, community builders, custom builders and regeneration specialists, as well as larger builders and developers.

The fund provides development finance and infrastructure finance via loans.

POWER TO CHANGE BUSINESS IN COMMUNITY HANDS

The £10 Million Community Business Fund re-opened in Summer 2017, with grants of between £50,000 and £300,000 available to community businesses.

To be considered for funding, your project and organisation must be incorporated, based in England and will need to be able to clearly evidence how you meet each of the 11 criteria below:

- 1. Be a community businesses
- 2. Be incorporated
- 3. Share the Power to Change Impact Goals
- 4. Have a charitable purpose
- 5. Have public benefit
- 6. Encourage growth and viability
- 7. Have at least one year of accounts
- 8. Find additional funding (not 100%)
- 9. Abide by State Aid regulations
- Be able to start in six months from accepting the grant offer
- 11. Adhere to capital and revenue request limits

LOCAL ENTERPRISE PARTNERSHIP

The Let's Grow programme provides grants of between £10,000 and £1 million to cover up to 20 per cent of your costs to invest, expand your business and create jobs.

Let's Grow is funded by the Government's Regional Growth Fund and is managed by BE Group in partnership with Clive Owen LLP.

Who can apply?

- SMEs that are based in York, North Yorkshire or the East Riding or are planning to invest here.
- Large companies may be eligible in certain circumstances, you'd need to discuss this with the BE Group.

What will Let's Grow funding contribute towards?

 Capital investment in land, buildings, plant, machinery and equipment, fit out and refurbishment

Are you eligible?

To receive funding you must be planning to spend at least £33,000 on eligible activity. You must also:

- Create or safeguard permanent jobs in York, North Yorkshire or the East Riding
- Offer good value for money in terms of value of grant per job created
- Make a clear case for needing grant support
- Have adequate private sector funding for the project
- Comply with State Aid regulations

These grants can be used to develop your business by investing in the development of skills or to develop the business or products.

Community / General Grants

COVENANT FUND

Grants up to £20,000 are available for community integration and local delivery of services projects through the Covenant Fund.

Community Integration - these projects should create strong local links between the Armed Forces community (current and former members of their armed forces and their families) and civilian communities - and be able to clearly demonstrate how they will have an impact in overcoming barriers to better integration and improving perceptions, attitudes and understanding.

Delivery of Local Services - these projects should be local and offer financial advice, housing, mental and physical health, employability or social support for serving armed forces personnel, veterans, and their families. Projects must be well connected, both to their beneficiaries and to other relevant organisations, and be able to demonstrate how the services they provide will be well-publicised, accessible and joined up.



The application must be from either a registered charity, a local authority, a school, a Community Interest Company or an armed forces unit with a UIN.

The Ministry of Defence (MOD) is looking for evidence of real engagement and partnership working - with either an armed forces charity or an armed forces unit. This is not a general fund for organisations to support their core activities simply by adding members of the armed forces community to their beneficiary group in order to apply for funding.

MOD strongly recommends that all applicants approach the local Covenant Partnership for the area in which the project is to be delivered, at the earliest possible stage and well before an application is submitted. Local Covenant Partnerships can help avoid duplication and signpost potential applicants to organisations that can help them develop their project. There is a single stage online application process for organisations applying to this programme. Submissions dates for 2018 are published on the Covenant Fund webpage.

If you are successful with your Local Grant application your organisation will be also able to benefit from the Covenant Fund's Digital Development Programme. A new resource will be made available online to all organisations working with the military community in early summer 2018 and will continue to grow into a significant facility for the sector.

BIG LOTTERY

AWARDS FOR ALL

Awards for All offers grants of between £300 and £10,000 for grassroots and community activity that aims to improve life for local people and neighbourhoods.

It does not have a deadline, so you can apply at any time. It is our most popular grants programme so we will prioritise groups with smaller incomes. Due to high demand on the programme, organisations that have a large annual income may not be able to get funding through Awards for All. You are recommended to send your application at least four months before you want your project to start.

BIG POTENTIAL

Big Potential will deliver approximately £10m of grant funding over three years to eligible voluntary, community and social enterprise organisations – to improve their sustainability, capacity and scale so they may deliver greater social impact.

The programme aims to raise awareness of the social investment market and support these organisations who want to prepare themselves for social investment.

Two application routes are available:

Breakthrough - specialist one to one support for organisations from Big Potential programme partners followed by a potential application for grants between £20,000 and £75,000 for more in-depth investment readiness work.

Advanced - for groups that are clear about how social investment could work for them and need help to close possible deals with investors or need help securing a contract.

Grants of between £50,000 and £150,000 are available.

CELEBRATE

Funding is for one off events or activities, which celebrate their local community. Grants are between £300 and £10,000 for VCSOs, schools and statutory bodies to bring communities together to mark something important, commemorate a local historic event or get to know one another better.

REACHING COMMUNITIES

The buildings strand of Reaching Communities provides funding for land and buildings projects costing more than £100,000. It can also provide revenue funding to help to get the building running and deliver project activities.

COMMUNITY FIBRE PARTNERSHIPS

Grants of £2million have been made available from BT Community Fibre Partnerships. They are for communities in the final 5% of the UK not covered by fibre broadband rollout plans. These provide match-funded grants of up to £20,000 toward the cost of their new fibre infrastructure if that could also serve their local school.

50% of the required funds could be available from the scheme with the community raising the additional 50%. BT has teamed up with the Community Fibre Partnerships

COMMUNITY BUILDINGS SUPPORT GRANTS

Organisations can access two types of grants for Community-led Building projects: Community-led Buildings Pre-Feasibility Grant and the Community-led Buildings Project Support Grant. Both of these grants apply to both community-led buildings and community-led housing projects.

DISCOVERY FOUNDATION GRANTS

The Santander Foundation has changed its name to the Discovery Foundation - to reflect the importance of its new flagship community programme. The Discovery Project will provide grants for local projects that give disadvantaged people the confidence to discover and create new opportunities.

Discovery Grants of up to £5,000 are available to UK registered charities, Community Interest Companies and Credit Unions to fund local projects helping disadvantaged people. Funding is available to cover part time salaries, equipment or materials but is for one year and must deliver a local project, not a national initiative. Applicants need to complete a Discovery Grant nomination form which is available in all Santander branches.

There are no closing dates and grants are made every month.

ESMEE FAIRBAIRN FOUNDATION

10,000 young people over 16 leave care each year, a third before their 18th birthday. This is in stark contrast to the general population where 50% are still living with their parents at 24. Through this programme, Esme Fairbairn wish to see care leavers supported by the system and by their networks to feel emotionally stable and be financially secure, ultimately making a successful transition to independence.

Funding is limited to the charitable work of organisations, and could be for core or project costs, including staff salaries and overheads. There are no limits on grant size or length, with the median average 2015 grant being £100,000 over three years. Most support is likely to be in the form of grants, but social investments will also be considered.

FANS FUND SMALL GRANTS SCHEME

GRANTS FOR WAR MEMORIALS

Works to freestanding war memorials are eligible for support through the Grants for War Memorials scheme, funded by English Heritage and The Wolfson Foundation.

Grants are available for up to 75% of eligible costs with an average maximum grant of £30,000. Grants can support the conservation, structural repair/stabilization, reinstatement, the addition of names or professional condition surveys and structural reports.

HELP THE HOMELESS GRANTS

YORKSHIRE LOCAL COUNCILS ASSOCIATION

The Yorkshire Local Councils Association is hosting a free information session, to provide support and guidance to all councils required to meet the obligations of the Transparency Code for Smaller Authorities.

The session will cover:

- The requirements of the Code
- How to ensure compliancy
- Changes to external audit regime why compliance is required
- Funding available to meet the financial burden of compliance with the Code
- Support and guidance completing an application for available funding

The session is for clerks and/or councillors of both member and non-member councils. If you are a council (not parish meeting) with an annual turnover of less than £25,000 you must comply with this Code so please reserve a place(s). Please be aware that the Department for Communities and Local Government is now starting to check that smaller councils have complied with this duty so it is vital that if your council is a smaller authority, you ensure that the Code is being adhered to. It is not complex.

NEAR NEIGHBOURS FUND

The Near Neighbours small grants programme has reopened for applications following an additional £1.5m investment from the UK Government.

Using the infrastructure of the Church of England, the funding programme provides small grants and support to grassroots groups to help run projects that bring about lasting benefits to neighbourhoods with significant religious diversity.

The idea is to bring people together that are religiously and ethnically diverse, so that they can get to know each other better, build relationships of trust and collaborate together on initiatives that improve the local community they live in. The funding covers a broad range of activities across the arts, the environment and sport.

NEIGHBOURHOOD PLANNING PROGRAMME

The Programme (2015-18) supports local communities to draw up a neighbourhood plan for their area. Town and parish councils, neighbourhood forums and prospective neighbourhood forums may apply.

Grants of between £1,000 and £8,000 are available for writing a plan or neighbourhood development order; with additional specific packages and a further grant of £6,000 for groups facing more complex issues.

NORTH YORKSHIRE REWARD GRANT FUND

The North Yorkshire Reward Grant Fund is available to small community groups and charities in North Yorkshire. A variety of local community groups and charitable projects that help make the county a better place have been funded by the scheme.

Created by the County Council, grants are made from the investment yield from endowed funds invested for the long term to support our local communities well into the future. The amount available for grant making each year will fluctuate with investment returns.

The fund is designed for projects which help communities to meet priorities that are contained within the North Yorkshire Community Plan at the time the grant is made and the criteria for the scheme will change from time to time to concentrate on a particular area of the plan.

This year priorities for funding will centre around projects that aim to improve the health and wellbeing of beneficiaries/communities through increasing participation in activities and / or removing barriers to involvement in activities that promote healthy lifestyles in disadvantaged communities. This could mean geographical disadvantage or communities of interest disadvantaged for some other reason.

ELIGIBILITY

This fund is available to voluntary and community groups, small registered charities and other not for profit organisations.

Groups must:

- be serving a community within the North Yorkshire local authority area
- have an annual income of less than £50,000 (in their last financial year)
- have a governing document (constitution/ rules/ memorandum/ articles of association) with a suitable charitable dissolution clause
- be a voluntary organisation, community group, small charity or other not for profit organisation
- have a bank account in the group's name
- have been in existence for at least six months

AVAILABLE FOR

- Projects aimed at increasing participation or removing barriers to involvement in activities that promote healthy lifestyles.
- Groups working in geographically disadvantaged areas or with communities of interest disadvantaged for some other reason to encourage healthy activity and promote wellbeing.

RESTRICTIONS

This fund is not available to/for:

- Private businesses, national organisations and affiliates
- Capital costs alone, there must be some activity
- General appeals or sponsorship
- Work that has already started or taken place
- Projects relating to the development of broadband
- Sports clubs for general running costs there must be some activity to reach out to engage with new beneficiaries to encourage sustainable and ongoing participation
- Work normally funded/undertaken by or on behalf of statutory bodies (including parish, town, district, borough, city and county councils; police, probation, national parks, NHS bodies)
- Work undertaken by/on behalf of schools, colleges or universities as part of their normal statutory curricular activities
- Work where the main beneficiaries are animals
- The advancement of religion
- Overseas holidays or trips

MORE THAN A PUB

The Community Pub Business Support Programme is a unique two year programme established **by the Plunkett Foundation** to help support community ownership of pubs in England. Its value is £3.62 million and is jointly funded by the Department for Communities and Local Government and Power to Change. A comprehensive package of business development support, advice and loan and grant funding has been developed to assist community pub businesses consider their viability at all stages of their development which includes:

A flexible package of support including:

- Advice line
- Events
- Workshops
- Peer-to-peer study visits
- Business development advice



PRINCE OF WALES'S CHARITABLE FOUNDATION

TESCO BAGS OF HELP

The money raised from the 10p bag charge in Tesco stores in England, Wales and Scotland is being used to support community participation in the development and use of open spaces. Projects that will get the green light as a result of the funding will include volunteer training, physical improvements of open spaces, equipment purchases, community events and sports and leisure activities.

Administration of the local funding is being managed by the community charity Groundwork.



Bags of Help is always open to applications from community projects. Groundwork assesses all of the applications received to ensure they are eligible. This is followed up by Tesco shortlisting groups decide which projects go forward to the in-store vote. Three local community projects will be voted on in Tesco stores each month across Tesco regions throughout England, Scotland and Wales. In each region, the project that received the most votes from all stores in their region will receive a grant of up to £5,000.

The second placed project receives up to £2,000 and third placed up to £1,000. Every year, over 7000 projects will receive funding through this scheme.

RICHMONDSHIRE DISTRICT COUNCIL SOCIAL FUND

The Social Fund is designed to support specific community projects or activities taking place within one of the five growth areas of Richmondshire. The latest deadline for applications was February 1, 2018 with the decision expected within two to three weeks of this deadline.

The scheme has a total of £270,000 to allocate for this financial year. Applications received will be considered on a quarterly basis and the scheme will close following the allocation of the total funds available. Applications are welcome from organisations which are based within or whose project will predominantly benefit the growth areas of:

Colburn - Hipswell - Leyburn - Richmond - Scotton

- Applications for grants should be for no less than £7,500 and no more than £50,000. Grants can be offered at a maximum grant rate of 30% of the total project costs, and it is expected that the applicants raise the remaining 70% of the costs
- Eligible organisations are required to have a constitution/evidence of governance which should accompany the application
- Generally, it is expected that the funding will be spent on tangible projects such as community facilities and infrastructure improvements, however revenue projects will be considered providing the applicant can demonstrate the wider social benefit to the project taking place
- A minimum of three quotes must be provided for each intended purchase
- Applications from public bodies such as schools or the MOD will be considered where the applicant can demonstrate a social benefit, however a Dual Use Agreement may be required to ensure the wider community can also benefit from the project
- Organisations that already receive core funding from Richmondshire District Council will be considered on a case by case basis
- Only invoices/receipts dated after the offer of a grant will be accepted as proof of expenditure and grants cannot be claimed retrospectively
- Applications from churches or religious affiliated organisations will not be considered, however applications from organisations utilising religious premises will be considered where the applicant can demonstrate an inclusive social benefit to the project
- Applications from political/pressure groups will not be considered
- General day to day running costs for example, staffing, rent or utilities - will not be eligible
- Applications to fund the purchase of a vehicle will not be considered.

TRANSFORM FOUNDATION

This funding programme can cover the up front costs of a new charity - specific website including strategy, design, development and training.

The grant will pay for the entire up front costs of £18,000. The Foundation will be rolling out other grant programmes later in the year, which are currently being designed. The website grant is aimed at small to medium-sized charities and other not for profit organisations with a social mission - including Community Interest Companies.

The grant is most suitable for non-profit making organisations with an income between £500,000 and £20 million. Applications can currently be made on a rolling basis.

Grants of up to £40,000 are available from this medium-sized grant making foundation for small, well-established organisations in the UK which address local issues in areas of extreme urban deprivation, or in remote and fragile rural communities.

Trusthouse gives grants for running costs or one-off capital costs to charities and not-for-profit organisations. 'Rural' in this context means cities, towns, villages and areas with 10,000 or less inhabitants which are classified in the latest government indices of Multiple Deprivation as being in the most deprived 50%.

The Foundation is interested in projects providing transport for the elderly, disabled or disadvantaged; contact networks for the young disabled; projects which encourage a sense of community such as community centres and village halls; employment training schemes especially those promoting local, traditional crafts; projects addressing issues such as drug/alcohol misuse or homelessness.

GRANT SCHEME FOR YOUTH WORK

LLOYDS BANK FOUNDATION



The Lloyds Bank Foundation for England and Wales - which provides funding to charities for projects to help people break their cycle of disadvantage - is open for applications. The Foundation operates two funding programmes – invest and enable.

Invest is a flexible, long term core funding programme for charities helping disadvantaged people. Grants are up to £25,000 per year for between two and six years, with the opportunity for continuation funding for up to six years in total.

Enable is a smaller and shorter grants programme for charities that have identified clear development needs. This funding aims to help the organisations deliver their mission more effectively. The grants are up to a total £15,000 for up to two years.

Funding is available to registered charities and charitable incorporated organisations (CIOs) with an income of between £25,000 and £1 million. To be eligible, organisations are expected to be working with people aged 17 years or older, experiencing multiple disadvantage at one of the critical points in their life. The only exceptions are young people who are under 17 years of age and young parents or looked after children and disabled young people moving into independent living.

COMMUNITY ASSET FUND

Whether it's the park you run through, the hall you do classes in or the pitch you play on, welcoming and accessible spaces have a big impact on a person's experience – and likelihood of coming back.

As part of this, Sport England has produced a guide and accompanying document to explain more about the new Community Asset Fund, how and why they're doing things differently, when they will make decisions plus tips and advice for developing your project or idea.

Sports clubs and community organisations can now apply for investment from the Community Asset Fund – Sport England's new capital fund dedicated to enhancing the spaces in local communities that give people the opportunity to be active.

This fund will have a value of £15 million per annum with the anticipated size of bids between £1000 and £150,000. There is no deadline to apply and awards will be made from February 2017.


SMALL GRANTS

Sport England can offer small grants to not-for-profit organisations to help people play more sport. Grants of between £300 and £10,000 are available, at any time during the year.

To be eligible, your project must meet the following criteria:

- Must fit with Sport England's Youth and Community Strategy
- Applications must be for between £300 and £10,000 and total project costs must not exceed £50,000.
- Projects must be deliverable in a 12 month period from the date of award letter.
- Projects must be focused on sports that are recognised by Sport England.
 Please note that for sports that Sport England deem higher risk, appropriate affiliation to the National Governing Body will be required.

Call: 0345 8508 508 if you are unsure whether your sport fits this criterion.



- Your project start date must be at least ten weeks after submission of your completed application and supporting documents.
- Your project must be for new activity and new costs associated with helping more people play sport.
